SEPTEMBER - The 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 6th-grade classes all participated in the Journey North Tulip Project this September! Two hundred bulbs were planted in all! Stearns sixth graders planted 100 bulbs in a beautiful plot expertly dug and cultivated by Mr. McInnis, and Granite 1, 2, and 3rd graders planted another 100 bulbs in front of the school in the existing flower bed. The students examined cross-sections of tulips bulbs, diagrammed, learned the parts of the tulip, and created 3-D models as part of the project. Along with 20 other schools across the country, they will track the signs of spring by inputting data on the Journey North website when their tulips emerge.

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DYSLEXIA

NOVEMBER - Did you know that dyslexia has its own set of gifts. These include greater development of intuition, the ability to perceive multi-dimensionally, vivid imagination, greater curiosity, insightfulness, the ability to experience thought as reality, heightened awareness of the environment, the ability to think in pictures, and, most important, the ability to alter and create perceptions. These are vital gifts that are becoming more and more sought after in the professional world (Davis & Braun, 2010). The person with dyslexia of today could be and might be the genius of tomorrow. The future of today's students is dependent on their ability to see the big picture, to predict trends, to read customers, to think outside the box, to see patterns, to inspire collaboration among peers, to empathize, to synthesize information from a variety of sources, and to perceive possibilities from different perspectives. These are the natural talents of people with dyslexia (Davis & Braun, 2010).

NEW YORK TAKES A STAND ON GIFTED

Expand Gifted and Talented Education: A Proposal to Scrap It Would Take City Schoolchildren in Exactly the Wrong Directi

NOVEMBER - New York takes a stand on Gifted education that will create a domino effect to other states. Problems require solutions, and complex problems require sophisticated solutions. Consider Mayor de Blasio's approach to struggling schools. Unlike his predecessor Mike Bloomberg, de Blasio hasn't closed struggling schools in masses. Across the city, he has invested in wraparound social services for children and families.

In historically underserved neighborhoods in the Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, the mayor and Chancellor Richard Carranza worked with the UFT to develop what is known as "the Bronx Plan," an investment in education designed to attract and retain staff with pay incentives and to provide schools access to more funds and supports to meet their students' needs.

That's the kind of approach the city should take to reforming gifted and talented programs. This fall, the School Diversity Advisory Group, which the mayor formed in 2017, recommended eliminating gifted and talented programs entirely. It's a terribly misguided approach; while reform is needed, we need to **expand and not contract, much less eliminate, specialized programs for high-achieving youngsters.** READ MORE
